

## Sustainability in Prisons Project at Washington Corrections Center for Women

The [Sustainability in Prisons Project \(SPP\)](#) was founded by [The Evergreen State College \(Evergreen\)](#) and Washington State Department of Corrections (DOC). The mission is to empower sustainable change by bringing nature, science, and environmental education into prisons.

In Washington State prisons, SPP aims to identify, celebrate and report on all work aligned with this mission. Programs may be initiated and operated by SPP founding partners or allied organizations. In 2017, the SPP collaboration included at least 186 programs and 117 partner organizations in all of the 12 prisons statewide. To extend

the reach and impact of environmental education and sustainability programs, the team works to bring benefits to and leverage resources of all partners. No singular organization or individual has the capacity or all the solutions needed to address complex environmental and incarceration issues.

SPP has received support from prisons across the state, and [Washington Corrections Center for Women \(WCCW\)](#) is a great example. This partnership allows both SPP and WCCW to address environmental incarceration issues. The SPP programs currently active at WCCW include [Roots of Success](#), the [Prairie Conservation Nursery](#), [beekeeping program](#), and the [Environmental Workshop Series](#). These collaborative programs provide quality environmental and sustainable living education, access to nature and opportunities for altruism. This important work couldn't take place without members of WCCW leadership and staff. Their contributions to the partnership are appreciated.

SPP-Evergreen staff are working to educate ourselves, and maximize social and environmental benefits for all partners including incarcerated individuals, scientists, corrections staff, educators, and students.
